

We are an autonomous, democratically governed congregation, funded through the contributions of friends and members, and affiliated with more than a thousand other congregations in the Unitarian Universalist Association.

Our Parish Committee, elected by the congregation, is a policy-making body responsible for administering the overall affairs of the church and leading the congregation toward the realization of its vision. Lay leadership and participation are essential to making our programs and ministries a reality. We all work together to build the caring community of the church.
